








WBOK Host Oliver Thomas said, "It's a great opportunity, especially what we





New Orleans Rapper Alfred Banks Becomes Mental Health Ambassador

May is Mental Health Awareness Month and New Orleans based rapper Alfred Banks is on a mission to be successful at his craft, while also helping to bring freedom to others.

In 2014 Alfred's brother Orlandas Banks took his own life after suffering from schizophrenia. His mental illness was a hard conversation not just for Orlandas, but also for his family.

"I come from a Black family.... from Uptown," says Banks. "We don't really talk about mental health issues."

Banks also have been open about his own struggles with mental health and has been open about

it in his music.

After the untimely death of his brother, he took a short break from creating music, then Alfred Banks decided to illustrate the pain through his art.

Those songs made up 'The Beautiful' Album, a work that's been embraced by organizations like the National Alliance on Mental Illness, which Banks is now an ambassador for. His songs have become lifechanging for his fans. On the opening track, 'The Funeral', Banks illustrates the funeral services for his brother. On the day of the service, the rapper had to leave early to drive to a performance he had that night.

"After a show, one woman told me her husband passed away from brain cancer," says Banks. "She was depressed and she wanted to harm herself. When she heard 'The Funeral', it stopped her from committing suicide."

Banks hopes that his work, along with his brother's memory, will break chains for others who are suffering in silence.

"I want to let people know that you're not by yourself," says Banks. "It's not something you have to deal with on your own."

Ronald Greene's Mother Says She's 'Hurting So Bad' Over Bodycam Video

"I'm so damn hurt. I'm hurting so bad. I broke down not too long ago. And I needed that," Mona Hardin, mother of Ronald Greene told NBC News.

Two years after her son's death, Mona Hardin has finally seen the bodycam footage that captures the fatal altercation between Ronald Greene and Louisiana police.

The Louisiana State Police agency released nine bodycam and dashcam videos on Friday after the Associated Press published footage they obtained. The videos show Greene's violent arrest near Monroe, Louisiana, during which officers kicked, punched, choked, tased, and dragged the 49-year-old.

Greene died following that arrest in May 2019 after he led police on a high-speed chase. Much of the brutalization occurred while Greene was already hand-cuffed. At one point, Greene tried to roll over in what some suspect was an attempt to breathe, and officers ordered him to stay face down on his stomach.

The officers identified are Louisiana State Troopers Chris Hollingsworth, Dakota DeMoss, and Kory

York. In another clip, officer Chris Hollingsworth, who died in 2020, is heard saying, "I beat the ever-living f— out of him. Choked him and everything else trying to get him under control. He was spitting blood everywhere, and all of a sudden he just went limp."

Hardin believes her son was murdered, and his death was imminent from the start of the arrest. "I'm so damn hurt. I'm hurting so bad. I broke down not too long ago. And I needed that," Hardin told NBC News. "I needed that because the anger, the boiling point of Louisiana and the corruption and my murder, the murder of my son, and how they had a good time doing it."

The autopsy performed by the Union Parish Coroner's Office did not identify a cause of death and noted missing information, CNN reports. Coroners cited "cocaine induced agitated delirium complicated by motor vehicle collision, physical struggle, inflicted head injury, and restraint," as a possible cause but also said that Greene's head injuries were "inconsistent with motor vehicle collision injury. These injuries are most consistent with multiple impact sites from a blunt object."

Greene's family alleges that in

addition to leaving Greene without medical care for roughly nine minutes following his arrest, officers attempted a cover up, initially telling them that Greene died from the impact of a car accident. Without the footage the Associated Press accessed, Hardin's legal team believes that there would have been no further investigation into Greene's death.

"We've seen a pattern in this country, an unfortunate pattern. When law enforcement alone are the only persons with access to critical evidence, like this kind of video, the process is to minimize the conduct, to keep it out of the eyes of the public and to protect the police officers," said Attorney Lee Merritt.

DeMoss was notified of his department's intention to fire him and York completed a 50-hour suspension and returned to duty, NBC News reports. Neither has been arrested.

Our Money Matters: Financial Wellness Program kicks off on seven HBCU campuses to advance Financial Health of Black college students

Miami — The Historically Black Colleges & Universities Community Development Action Coalition (HBCU CDAC) is proud to announce the launch of a comprehensive financial wellness initiative, Our Money Matters (OMM) for college students of color. This new \$5.6 million initiative, funded exclusively by the Wells Fargo Foundation, is taking a more holistic approach to helping students who may be facing food and housing insecurity, college debt and other financial hardships to increase opportunities for financial inclusion and future economic success.

HBCU CDAC also announced the launch of OMM on seven HBCU campuses: Allen University, Bowie State University, Lincoln University, Miles College, Morris Brown College, Southern University at New Orleans, and University of Illinois at Chicago.

Over the next three years, OMM will expand to 25 HBCU and Minority Serving Institution (MSI) campuses across the U.S., equipping roughly 40,000 students of color and the extended community with much needed financial capability skills, personalized tools for managing finances and student loans, and access to support services like career closets and emergency financial assistance. Over the long term, this initiative aims to accelerate opportunities for building generational wealth within communities of color to help to close the racial wealth divide.



"The initiation of the OMM program is especially timely as the economic burden of COVID-19 is projected to have a devastating impact on HBCUs, MSIs, and surrounding communities. The OMM program is a proactive solution positioned to address these issues and generational wealth disparities within communities of color. Our partnership with the Wells Fargo Foundation demonstrates our aligned interest in equipping our partner institutions and their surrounding communities with the financial tools needed to create wealth for generations to come", said Ron Butler, CEO of HBCU CDAC.

"As a financial institution, we believe we have a responsibility to do even more to accelerate financial inclusion for people of color," said Darlene Goins, head of Financial Health Philanthropy at Wells Fargo. "HBCUs and MSIs are known for helping generations of Black youth and other students of color achieve academic and professional success. Working with HBCU CDAC, we hope to support students who may be navigating complex financial challenges and give them a stron-

ger foundation for future success and opportunities for wealth generation."

Through its holistic "wrap around" approach to addressing the myriad of factors that have contributed to the persistent wealth gap, OMM's programs and resources will engage, educate, support and scale financial capability and wealth creation in communities of color while disrupting and removing barriers to economic opportunity. The program has three primary components:

The Online Financial Counseling Hub, powered by iGrad, is a digital platform that helps students manage their day-to-day finances and build new skills and habits for life after college, including personalized tools for managing student loans, car loan calculator, investment analyzer, and access to certified financial planners.

The Financial Curriculum, developed in collaboration with academics and financial professionals, includes a wide variety of financial health courses and interactive activities, which faculty and staff can also integrate into general educa-

tion and degree programs.

OMM Service Suite connects students with on campus and community-based support services such as housing assistance, employment opportunities, and career closets that provide access to appropriate interview and work attire.

"Lincoln remains committed to supporting students to persist to and through graduation. This comprehensive education program teaches students financial literacy and connects them with resources to address their financial gaps," comments Dr. Brenda A. Allen, President, Lincoln University.

Partnering with Our Money Matters is going to be a great resource for our students," said Bobbie Knight, President, Miles College "This program will provide an important tool to teach our students the importance of good money management and financial responsibility."
