a lot with Hurricane Katrina, and what I went through taught me a lot about survival and what was necessary to sustain in these conditions."


"It helped me prepare to do for myself and others, so I had generators, water, I provided food and essentials, gas for generators, so that power can be on in houses. I also provided toiletries, pampers, wipes and ice. It was a situation where I could help people when they could not help themselves. Not because they did not have the ability, but because the of lack of resources. I felt good to be able to perform these duties, and by the grace of God help my fellow citizens get these essential supplies in their time of need."

### Giving a Place of Hope and Refuge

The Lucky Johnson Community Center located in New Orleans East is a beacon of light, providing services that empower and inspire. During these perilous and uncertain times Johnson's Community Center became a place of refuge for those in need.

"Normally, my community center serves multiple purposes that include hosting stage plays, after school tutoring, birthday parties and events, yoga instructions, exercise and these are free to the community."

Continuing he says, "I also do acting classes, a church uses it on Sunday. In storms I transform it to a shel-

ter, there is a radio station where I do a podcast and I the teach kids how to use the equipment. Also, there are boxing classes, self- defense, a restaurant and office space."

When word came that Hurricane IDA would hit New Orleans, and leaving much destruction in its wake, Johnson, leaped into action to help the most vulnerable citizens of New Orleans.

"My community center was a place of refuge for the handicap, the elderly who could not get away and I allowed them to come there and powered it with a generator. I also

own several buses, so I was able to bus people out free of charge to get them to their family and friends in Atlanta, Houston and Tennessee."

#### Helping in the Clean-Up Effort

Also, as many have come to see upon returning, that the city is having a problem with trash and debris that are in every pocket of the city. It is a monumental task and will take time. And the elected leadership is working hard to fix this problem, but it is causing concern from the citizens, who for weeks have had

its unsightly presence. Johnson understands these challenges, and is trying to help the residents, and for a nominal fee is hauling away trash bags and debris.

"Weeks later, I am still working hard getting things done, because we have a trash and debris problem. I think those charged with doing this work at the governmental level are overwhelmed and are trying their best with the resources they have, but I decided that I would contribute and do my part. I put a team together to help minimize their workload.

I purchased five dump trailers and hired 20 guys and I have two shifts and we are picking up trash bags, not the cans and also debris. We are hauling the trash to the free site that the mayor has stipulated and the debris in the east."

Understanding that the leadership are doing their part to try to get as much as they can in the recovery effort and realizing the bureaucracy to coordinating his efforts with them. Johnson listened to his inner voice and the cries of the people, who have to live in condi-

The Clerk's Office consists of two divisions - Land Records and Civil. Our Civil Division is where civil cases, such as personal injury, accidents, successions and foreclosures are filed. Domestic matters, such as divorce and child support, are also handled in the Civil Division.

The Land Records Division is where documents regarding property are recorded. Documents regarding changes in ownership, sales donations, as well as, mortgages, liens, and encumbrances are recorded in our Land Records Division.

The Notarial Archives Research Center is also located in our Land Records Division. These documents, which date back to the 1700s, represent the rich history of New Orleans. The archives can be used for property, genealogical, architectural and landscaping research

# **Towards a Clean New Orleans**

New Orleans continues to have a problem with trash and debris all over the city in the aftermath of Hurricane IDA. Weeks later city leaders are working hard to get things cleaned up, in this, which is the beginning of a long recovery.

But this did not stop frustrated residents of the City who've endured the rainy conditions last weekend to send a message to City leaders about their dissatisfaction with their response and progress of the cleanup effort.

In response to the concerns of citizens, New Orleans Mayor LaToya Cantrell is working to put more boots on the ground by announcing Operations Mardi Gras Clean Up, which pulls city employees from other departments for garbage collection.

This is a story that is far from over, as the City of New Orleans and its residents work towards rebuilding their homes and communities. In addition, city leaders are trying to come up with plans and resources towards the recovery effort

# Emergency Food Stamps D-SNAP Available For Those Affected By Hurricane Ida

#### USDA approves D-SNAP benefits for 25 Louisiana parishes impacted by IDA. Here's how to apply.

Food stamp qualification rules are temporarily changed to include storm-related damages as part of income calculations, which could allow many households — even those with six-figure incomes — to receive groceries — about \$680 worth for a family of four. People already receiving regular food stamps can't apply.

Applicants have to phone the agency — at (888) 524-3578 — and be interviewed by staff between 7:30 a.m. and 6 p.m. Applicants will be asked about income, checking and savings account balances and other financial assets, as well as about a wide range of costs caused by the storm. The interview takes about 22 minutes to complete. Most applicants will

#### **Application Schedule**

Residents should call the LA-HelpU Customer Service Center to apply and be interviewed for DSNAP on their designated day (according to the first letter of their last name) or on the A-Z days, which are open to all residents in the approved parishes and ZIP codes for each phase. Par-

ishes were assigned to each phase based on power, telephone/internet connectivity, mail delivery and grocery stores are open at the time the DSNAP request was submitted.

# **Back to the Classroom**

## A Game Plan for Reducing Anxiety

Back-to-school supplies were a bit different this year for 13-year-old Kamsi Anomnachi.

Along with a day planner, an array of pens, and a couple of thick notebooks, Kamsi added

face masks, hand sanitizer, disinfectant wipes, and disposable gloves.


"I'm excited to go back, but I am also really nervous," said Kamsi of her middle school in Washington, D.C.

"I have asthma and need to be extra careful. I just don't know how it's all going to work."

Kamsi, like many across the country, spent the last school year in a virtual classroom interacting with other students and teachers only via a computer screen.

Going back to in-person learning with potential restrictions only added to her anxiety.

"Returning to school with other peers may cause some students to think about the added pressure to



connect with others while trying to stay focused on their learning. In addition, it will take time for students to physically, emotionally, and mentally transition back into the full school day routine in person," said Tamela Odom, an elementary school teacher in Washington, DC.

But parents can help prepare their children for what may be a tough transition.

"Talk to your child about what things they are looking forward to upon returning to school and things that they may feel anxious or nervous about," Odom said. "Brainstorm strategies to help them navigate things they may feel uneasy about."

Kamsi's mom, Benefit, freely emails teachers with questions and regularly talks with Kamsi about her day.

She also designates every Monday evening as family time. As a Jehovah's Witness, she looks for practical Bible-based advice to help with any issues or concerns.

"We review how to display Christian qualities such as love, patience, and respect using articles and videos from jw.org. Also, I have roleplaying sessions to help Kamsi with straightforward, respectful answers in different situations," said Benefit.

"This has helped Kamsi feel confident and excited about returning to school."

While coronavirus variants have stoked pandemic anxieties, Benefit has endeavored not to overlook other challenges her daughter may face.

One of their favorite resources is jw.org, the official website of Jehovah's Witnesses that is free to all.

Topics like "What's a Real Friend?" and "Beat a Bully Without Using Your Fists" are addressed in a video series for young people that Kamsi recommends to everyone.

"I really like the website! It has a lot of helpful and practical things, like articles, videos, animations," said Kamsi.

"It will benefit kids if they are anxious about going back to school, the delta variant or anything really. I always share it with everyone."

He's been in films with many

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
