The Anthony Bean Community Theater (ABCT) continues to be a leader in bringing quality produc-

tions to the stage. For over two decades garnering many awards along the way lead by Anthony Bean, it is more than just theater, but is aimed at telling positive stories about African Americans, changing narratives, and empowering the community.

While ABCT have been in existence for over 20 years, Anthony Bean's history with theater goes back

to the 1970's while still a teen, he and his older brother, the late Monroe "Jomo Kenyatta" Bean began the Ethiopian Theater in 1973. Jon Batiste Triumphs at Grammy Awards

Jon Batiste took home the Grammy for Album of the Year for "We Are" during Sunday night's 2022 Grammys.

Reflecting a bit on how music has always played a prominent part in his life, Batiste said the craft of music is "more than entertainment" but rather a "spiritual practice" for him.

In addition to thanking his team and shouting out the family members featured on his album, Batiste also praised his fellow nominees. "I actually love and have had an out-of-body experience with your music. I honor you," he said.

"This is for real artists, real musicians. Let's just keep going: Be you," he concluded his speech.

Going into the night, Batiste was the leading nominee with eleven nods, including in the top categories of Record of the Year and Album of the Year. Despite dominating this year's race, Batiste was just shy a nomination to be a Grammy recordholder for most nominations in a single year, which has included Michael Jackson and Babyface, who each scored twelve nods in a single year. Meanwhile, Kendrick Lamar received eleven nominations for the 2016 ceremony but only won five awards.

In the non-televised ceremony earlier in the day, Batiste also won four awards: best music video for "Freedom," best score soundtrack for visual media for Soul, and best American roots performance and best American roots song for "Cry."

Backstage in the Grammys press room, Batiste continued to express how grateful he felt for the honor and how Lenny Kravitz presenting the award proved to be a "full-circle moment" for him.

"I really don't do it for the awards. I really believe that music is something that's so subjective, but I was having such a good time. We just performed, I was hanging with my family, and when my name came up and the 'We Are' title was said by Lenny, such a full-circle moment because we played together when I was sixteen," he said of the "surreal" moment.

U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee Votes to Advance Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson to Full Floor Vote to be Confirmed the First Black Woman U.S. Supreme Court Justice

Washington, D.C. – On Monday, April 4th, 2022, Melanie L. Campbell, President & CEO of the National Coalition on Black Civic Participation (NCBCP) and Convener of the Black Women's Roundtable (BWR) issued the following statement after the Senate Judiciary committee voted to advance Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson's Nomination to a full floor vote in the U.S. Senate to serve as the next U. S. Supreme Court Justice.

"I commend the U. S. Senate Judiciary Committee for acting swiftly on Judge Jackson's confirmation process. Now that Judge Jackson is voted out of committee, she is one step closer to being the first Black woman to serve on the United States Supreme Court. This historic moment brings her one step closer to realizing the promise of our nation; one step closer to having a legal system and federal government that reflects our nation's full diversity; one step closer to a reality where little Black girls will see themselves on the highest court in the land. Simply put, we are one step closer to making herstory!

"As a Black woman, I could not be more proud and thankful to see how Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson persevered through this confirmation process. Her grace, confidence and mastery of the law demonstrated that she is more than qualified to serve on this nation's highest court. National Support Grows for FCC to Adopt Rule Change to Empower Minority-Owned Media Businesses

There is a growing national momentum of support among civil rights organizations, communications experts and media business leaders who are encouraging the Federal Communications Commissions (FCC) to adopt the proposed rule change that will help to empower minority-owned media businesses throughout the nation.

Black-owned radio stations and other minority-owned media businesses should be permitted by the FCC to compete fairly, equitably, and diversely with large television and cable stations that have been already granted the right by the FCC to geotarget audiences across America.

The established strategic alliance between The National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA), National Association of Black Owned Broadcasters (NABOB), the Multicultural Media, Telecom & Internet Council (MMTC), and other related national organizations is working diligently to ensure greater diversity, equity and inclusion in our nation's communications industry.

Today the issue of geotargeting of content to diverse and underserved communities is a critical and crucial threshold that minorityowned media businesses should

follow us on

have the right to engage accordingly. We believe it is time now for the FCC to act and to vote favorably for this important rule change.

Local radio stations are the only ad medium not permitted to geotarget their audiences. Currently FCC rules prohibit content origination on FM boosters that preclude an innovative technology for local FM stations to offer over-the-air geotargeting. There is an FCC rulemaking proceeding now underway that would change the rule and let local radio stations do what all other local ad-supported media do with respect to geotargeted content and ads. Importantly, the rule change would allow stations to voluntarily adopt the geotargeting technology, but would not mandate it. The proposed rulemaking change will substantially increase the access to geotargeting by minority-owned radio stations

and other minority-owned businesses that is so vital and effective in today's global and national media marketplace.

The FCC has authorized experimental tests of the new technology in San Jose, California and Jackson, Mississippi. The test in Jackson was conducted on a Black owned station that serves a Black audience. The results of both tests show that the technology works exactly as predicted and that it can provide a very effective method of geotargeting to specific areas.

The proposed FCC rulemaking change is supported strongly by the major national civil rights organizations including the NAACP, National Urban League, National Action Network, National Council of Negro Women, National Coalition on Black Civic Participation, National Congress of Black Women,

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Hispanic Federation, National Hispanic Caucus of State Legislators, and the U.S Black Chambers.

In conclusion, I reiterate again the point I made in a previous letter on this subject to the FCC: "I have spent much of my career as a civil rights leader focused on ensuring that technological developments like the one at issue in this proceeding lift all of America, and not just some of us. Too often, I have seen the benefits of technological development accrue to the privileged, with little or no benefit to disadvantaged communities, including some with which I work on a daily basis."

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College Slam Dunk & 3-Point Championship Showcased the Best in College Basketball

While so many things were going on all over New Orleans during Final Four weekend where the Kanas Jayhawks captured their fourth NCAA National Championship. But that was not all that was going on in New Orleans.

Fans from everywhere packed Xavier University of Louisiana's Convocation Center on March 31st to see the State Farm College Slam Dunk & 3-Point Championship. The best college basketball players in the country came out to play in the 33rd Annual Event. Twenty-four athletes came to partake in three events, but only three left as the winners.

"If I could describe tonight in one word, it would be amazing. I felt like a little kid in a candy story," said Taze Moore, a guard at the University of Houston.

Moore won the College Slam Dunk title against six other players. He went up against Alondes Williams from Wake Forest University in the final round and was able to bring enough skill to take home the championship belt. Moore's success was no surprise given that he will be entering the 2022 National Basketball Association Draft. He ended the contest earning perfect scores for each of his final dunks, proving why he is amongst the best players.

"It's a blessing to be here around all of these great players. They picked me to be one of the best shooters in the country so I'm grateful to be here," said Amber Ramirez, a guard from the University of Arkansas.

Along with Ramirez, seven other women played in the women's 3-Point Competition. Kendall Spray from Florida Gulf Coast University was the winner of this category. Aisha Sheppard from Virginia Tech University was able to make it to the final round with Spray but with a score of 23-16, Spray took the title and moved onto the Battle of the Champions.

The Battle of the Champions consisted of Spray and Jordan Bohannon, a player from the University of Iowa and the winner of the Men's 3 Point Competition. Despite her previous win, Spray lost this 3-point contest to Bohannon with a score of 19-21. Bohannon, Spray, and Moore got to take home their titles, but every player proved why they were among the premier players in the country at the slam.

"This had to have been one of the best fields this event has ever had. This was a cool event. I was very fortunate to win," Bohannon said.
