

Rev. Dr. Frederick D. Haynes III Succeeds Rev. Jesse L. Jackson Sr. as President and CEO of Rainbow PUSH Coalition

Tributes have continued to pour in for the Rev. Jesse Jackson, who announced on July 14 his retirement as President and CEO of the Rainbow PUSH Coalition,

the influential civil rights organization he started decades ago to carry on the struggle for equality and justice that Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. fought heroically.

The organization said Rev. Dr. Frederick D. Haynes III will succeed Jackson.

"The promise of America is that we are all created equal in the image of God and deserve to be treated equally throughout our lives. While we've never fully lived up to that promise, we've never fully walked away from it because of extraordinary leaders like Reverend Jesse Jackson, Sr.," President Joe Biden stated.

"Throughout our decades of friendship and partnership, I've seen how Reverend Jackson has helped lead our nation forward through tumult and triumph."

The President continued:

"Whether on the campaign trail, on the march for equality, or in the room advocating for what is right and just, I've seen him as history will remember him: a man of God and of the people; determined, strategic, and unafraid of the work to redeem the soul of our nation."


One of Jackson's comrade in the civil rights struggle, National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA) President and CEO Dr. Benjamin F. Chavis Jr., echoed Biden's remarks.

"On behalf of the NNPA, representing the Black Press of America, I am so pleased to issue the NNPA's highest regards and respect to the Honorable Rev. Jesse L. Jackson Sr.," Chavis remarked.

"I have known and worked with the Rev. Jackson all of my adult life as a fellow freedom fighter in the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, NAACP, Rainbow PUSH, United Church of Christ Commission for Racial Justice, and the National African American Leadership Summit."

Chavis continued:

"Rev. Jackson's transformative 'Run Jesse Run' presidential cam-

paigns in the 1980s irreversibly changed America for the better.

"The Black Press resolutely salutes Jesse Jackson's outstanding national and global leadership, and we pledge to keep fighting for freedom, justice, equality, and equity."

Jackson, a renowned figure in

the fight for civil rights, founded PUSH (People United to Save Humanity) in 1971 and established the National Rainbow Coalition in 1984.

In 1996, the two organizations merged to form the powerful and influential Rainbow PUSH Coalition

Organization officials said Dr. Haynes, a Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference, Inc. co-chair, has exemplified the same passion and commitment to global racial justice that characterizes Jackson's legacy.

As a co-founder of the Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference

(SDPC), Inc., Haynes has been a guiding force for over two decades, upholding the mission and ministry of the organization.

"This nation has entered a new era of struggle against racial injustices, hate speech, new forms of institutional oppression against the poor, people of color, and those marginalized due to religion or sexual orientation," said Dr. Iva Carruthers, general secretary, and co-founder of the SDPC.

Bishop Leah Daughtry, co-chair of the SDPC, highlighted the necessity for collaboration between national and local organizations during what he called critical times.

"Collaboration between national and local organizations is ever more needed at this time," he said in a news release.

According to his official biography, Jackson was born on October 8, 1941, in Greenville, South Carolina.

He graduated from the public schools in Greenville and then enrolled in the University of Illinois on a football scholarship.

Big Freedia's Remix of Classic Children's Song 'Row, Row, Row Your Boat' Goes Viral

Queen of Bounce, said she is finding joy in making music for children.

Videos of parents dancing with their children to a remixed version of "Row, Row, Row Your Boat" have flooded social media, thanks to a popular Children's Educational YouTube Series started by a Black family. The song, now a viral sensation, has also become an entertaining and fun dancing experience for both children and adults.

The "Row Row Row Your Boat Remix" featuring Big Freedia comes from the Animated Children's You-Tube Channel Gracie's Corner. Since the song's release last month, it has garnered over 6 million views on You-Tube and 2 million views on TikTok, with parents dancing with their children to the catchy melody.

A typical song on Gracie's Corner, starring 10-year-old Graceyn, combines educational songs or nursery rhymes with modern beats from multiple genres, including hip-hop and Afrobeats, displayed in the channel's "ABC Song." In the videos, Gracie, a Black girl with natural hair, often sings with members of her family and her friends of different races.

In this remix, though, Gracie is accompanied by Big Freedia, known as the Queen of Bounce Music, a unique style of hip-hop from New Orleans. She adds her signature elements to this viral hit, with fast tempo beats and lines like "You better row!"

Big Freedia collaborated with Gracie's Corner because of her inclination to "do anything for the kids," she said. It's also meaningful, she added, because bounce music is "part of our culture" and empowers people to express themselves "musically and on the dance floor."

"It's just important for me to be a part of it because it helps to keep on pushing the culture and pushing to make our kids know what's going on and what's happening out there in the world," Big Freedia said. "And you know, what's better than nursery rhymes to get the kids' attention?"





King High School Resurrects Its Mu Lambda Kappa Fraternity

Mentorship Program Returns As COVID-19 Restrictions Are Lifted

NEW ORLEANS - Dr. M. L. King. Jr. High School has resurrected the Mu Lambda Kappa Fraternity (MLK), after not having a line for three years due to COVID-19 restrictions. MLK is a one-of-a-kind program for high school students in New Orleans.

"The purpose of the MU Lambda Kappa fraternity is to foster mentorship by forming a brotherhood around common goals and aspirations. It is our goal to assist these young men to be pillars in their homes, communities, and wherever they go," said Clarence Octave, one of the founders of MLK.

MLK was founded on February 21, 2009, after administrators at King High School asked Octave to start a male mentoring program for students. The fraternity began with eight founders known as "The




Great Eight:" Clarence Octave, Kerry Pierre, David Foster, Russell King, Darrow Rowe, Amir Elliole, Daryl Person, and Carde McDaniel. The fraternity later became a corporate organization in 2011. The

fraternity's mission is the DREAM: discipline, respect, education, attitude, and mentoring.

Last spring, MLK welcomed its first line of students since its resurrection. The young men were select-



ed based on character, academics, and letters of recommendation. "We would like to thank Hassan Robertson, Chase Taylor, and Malik Cheneau, three graduating seniors who




helped carry and pass the torch to our new brothers," said Octave.



Mogul Jay-Z Shawn Carter Foundation Raises 20 Million Dollars to Aid with Education

The Shawn Carter Foundation, co-founded in 2003 by Jay-Z and his mother, Gloria Carter, hosted a black-tie gala in New York City on Friday (July 14th), raising \$20 million that will be used to help people facing socio-economic hardships further their education at post-secondary institutions.

The fundraising included a \$10 million legacy donation to the foundation from Jeff Bezos and Lauren Sanchez. Jack Dorsey donated an additional \$2 million as part of his annual contribution.

The organization's Friday night gala at Pier Sixty celebrated the 20th Anniversary of The Shawn Carter Foundation and welcomed a number of high-profile guests in music, sports, business and entertainment.

Jay-Z and Ms. Carter were of course in attendance, as was Beyoncé, who shared a series of photos from the evening on Instagram. Jackson later transferred to North Carolina A&T State University and graduated in 1964.

He began his theological studies at Chicago Theological Seminary but, according to his bio, deferred his studies when he started working full-time in the Civil Rights Movement with Dr. King.

Ordained by Rev. Clay Evans on June 30, 1968, Jackson received his Master of Divinity degree from Chicago Theological Seminary in 2000. For his work in human and civil rights and nonviolent social change, Jackson has received over 40 honorary doctorate degrees and frequently lectures at major colleges and universities, including Howard, Yale, Princeton, Morehouse, Harvard, Columbia, Stanford and Hampton.

He was made an Honorary Fellow of Regents Park College at Oxford University in the UK in November 2007 and received an Honorary

Fellowship from Edge Hill University in Liverpool, England.

In March 2010, Jackson earned induction into England's prestigious Cambridge Union Society.

In April 2010, he was awarded an honorary doctorate from the University of KwaZulu-Natal in South Africa.

In October 1997, President Bill Clinton appointed Jackson as Special Envoy of the President and Secretary of State for the Promotion of Democracy in Africa.

"Jill and I are grateful to Rev. Jackson for his lifetime of dedicated service and extend our appreciation to the entire Jackson family," Biden added.

"We look forward to working with the Rainbow PUSH Coalition as he hands the torch to the next generation of leadership, just as we will continue to cherish the counsel and wisdom that we draw from him."
