



It was a great night honoring these legends of the City of New Orleans, and Data News Weekly was there!!!



Vote YES for Housing Trust Fund

(Parishwide HRC Amendment No.

1) on the November 5th ballot!

The November 5th election will be historic in many ways and New Orleans can make history too. For the first time in the city's history, citizens are considering a dedicated revenue for Affordable Housing. Instead of levying a new tax, the people of New Orleans have demanded that city officials use existing funds strategically

and prioritize keeping its citizens housed safely. This new Housing Trust Fund (Parish-wide HRC Amendment No. 1) will allow the city to respond to the crises' that are the most pressing while giving New Orleans a chance to plan long-term on guaranteed revenue.

The New Orleans Housing Crisis has become more drastic the last few years. African Americans, seniors, families, and women have been especially hard-hit by the recent rise in homelessness with a 5% increase in homelessness over last year (to 1,545). Family homelessness has soared 69% in the past two years and homelessness among Black people has risen 7% this past year. Climate change intensified hurricanes and rain events drove increases in utility

costs—creating a population burdened by utility debt. Since the COVID-19 Pandemic, sky high insurance rates, property taxes and construction costs have contributed to the historic housing insecurity. This means that we need to increase our investment in housing without increases housing costs. The answer is simple: a Housing Trust Fund using existing revenue that guarantees the amount available every single year and builds in transparency and accountability for every dollar spent.


The power of repetition tells us that you may have to say something seven times for someone to act. For the seventh year in a row, the 2024 HousingNOLA Report Card shared a failing grade for New Orleans in its efforts to meet the most fundamental needs of its citizens: Housing. There is no better example of New Orleans stopping itself from being all it can be - than the crisis the people are facing when it comes to keeping their housing.

That's why Amendment No. 1 on the November 5th ballot is so important. If voters approve the ballot measure this November, it will amend the City Charter to require an investment of at least two percent of the City's Annual General Operating Budget into the HTF and create the flexibility to fund Affordable Housing projects our city desperately needs, expand programs to help first-time homebuyers, rehab rental units and provide financial support to Affordable Housing. It is the best

way to communicate our demand of our leaders that they put people first and #PutHousingFirst!

Living here is the baseline requirement for being a New Orleanian, yet most of the people who live here cannot afford it. What would New Orleans be without them? Sadly, we may find out, because we continue to fail them when it comes to Affordable Housing. The numbers are in, and we aren't doing enough when it comes to creating a system implementing the strategies that are necessary to give people the chance to stay and thrive. We can take an extraordinary step forward by voting YES for Housing Trust Fund (Parish-wide HRC Amendment No. 1) on the November 5th ballot!








New Orleans Agenda

Community organizations are proud to lead a dynamic, impactful effort this election season, focused on voter registration, education, and mobilization. Together, we are empowering young people to make their voices heard by helping students register to vote and get to the polls. Closing Arguments

Harris Seeks a Unified America While Trump's Final Rally Descends into Bigotry and Chaos

As Election Day draws closer, the divide between Kamala Harris and Donald Trump has become a chasm. With the help of wellknown supporters like Beyoncé, Usher, and Bruce Springsteen who gathered in cities across the country to support her inclusive platform, Harris, the Democratic presidential nominee, has spent the final days of her campaign calling for unity among Americans. Meanwhile, Trump, the Republican nominee, took the stage at Madison Square Garden, delivering a closing pitch that unleashed xenophobic, racially charged rhetoric, painting an America under siege and promising a wave of mass deportations starting on Day 1.



In the final days of her campaign, Kamala Harris is bringing voters together in a broad coalition of voters in her quest to become the next President of the United States. Recently, she held a large rally in Texas, where superstar, mogul, and cultural icon Beyonce' Knowles Carter endorsed her run for the White House.

Beyoncé joined Harris onstage in Houston, stating, "I'm not here as a celebrity. I'm here as a mother." Springsteen spoke to Harris's core values, noting, "She believes in the rule of law and the peaceful transfer


of power." The entertainers championed a vision that they argue will protect democracy, safeguard freedoms, and promote unity—a vision starkly opposed to Trump's divisive tirade at the World's Most Famous Arena, where just blocks away, Trump was found guilty of 34 felony charges this year and only a few miles from the court that held him responsible for sexual assault.

His civil conviction on massive business fraud also occurred across town from The Garden.

Trump's rally, marketed as a historic comeback, was instead a showcase of his campaign's unrestrained hostility. He anchored his speech on his promise of a massive deportation program, calling the country "occupied" by immigrants—a message reminiscent of historical demagogues. Outside, the Democrats made their own

statements, projecting the messages "Trump is Unhinged" and "Trump Praised Hitler" across the storied arena's exterior.

Before Trump even reached the podium, his supporters stoked racial hatred and fear. Former congressional candidate David Rem attacked Harris, calling her "the antichrist" and "the devil" while waving a cross. Comedian Tony Hinchcliffe plunged into outright racism, referring to Puerto Rico as "a floating island of garbage" and demeaning Latinos with, "These Latinos, they love making babies, too." Radio host Sid Rosenberg went further, railing against migrants living in New York and declaring, "You got homeless and veterans-Americans—sleeping on their own feces on a bench in Central Park. But the f**king illegals, they get whatever they want, don't they?"
