




Leo Nocentelli Presents "Another Side: A Live Acoustic Reintroduction"

Judge Halts Homeless Sweeps in New Orleans

The battle between the city and state on how to address the city's homelessness problem continues. Admittedly, it is a complex problem, and a one size fits all solution is not the solution. This week, a New Orleans judge issued a temporary restraining order on Monday, pausing the ongoing sweeps of homeless encampments in the city, according to Councilmember Lesli Harris' Chief of Staff.

This ruling comes on the heels of the Louisiana State Police (LSP) clearing encampments in the Historic French Quarter and relocating individuals to a site under the Business 90 overpass at Calliope Street

The intervention has sparked debates between state and city officials. Governor Jeff Landry defended the state-led sweeps, citing the city's failure to meet a self-imposed Thanksgiving deadline to clear the encampments.

"If the city is unable to do their part to clean New Orleans up, we will," Landry stated.

Harris released a statement regarding the issue:

"The State began taking drastic action to hide unhoused residents last month when they concentrated people and their belongings in one



Councilmember Harris criticized the sweeps, arguing that they disrupted the city's long-term efforts to rehouse individuals permanently. She noted that approximately 60 people awaiting permanent housing were displaced due to earlier sweeps near the Superdome.


Calliope. That location, where more than 75 people were moved, lacked basic health and safety facilities, including port-a-lets and trash cans. People lost their belongings and their dignity.

The sweeps had lasting consequences on the City's push to decommission encampments, which relies on connecting individuals to permanent supportive housing through the Home for Good initiative. Case Managers lost contact with over 63 unhoused residents,

who were set to be housed within weeks. Those same people made their way into neighborhoods, making outreach more difficult, and went back to previous encampments that had already been closed.

Despite a seemingly productive dialogue among State and City partners about effective ways to collaborate on homelessness, the State is set to move forward with another round of sweeps. As I did last month, I encourage residents to relay their concerns to the Governor's constituent services office at 225-342-0991 or 844-860-1413.

My office is committed to partnering with the Office of Homeless Services and Strategy, the Health Department, Unity of Greater New Orleans, Traveler's Aid, and Clutch Consulting to ensure unhoused residents receive needed services and are connected to housing. I truly commend OHSS, which has led the way in housing over 650 people since last year, many just in the last month. Their dedication is why I fought to ensure the City's 2025 Budget added seven more positions to the City Homelessness Team, along with an increase in operating funds. As we did last month, local partners will try to track unhoused community members impacted by the upcoming sweeps to ensure they remain connected to services and housing resources."

Clyburn, Pressley, Scanlon, Colleagues Urge Biden to Use Clemency Power to Address Mass Incarceration Before Leaving Office


Last week, Congressman James E. Clyburn (SC-06), Congresswoman Ayanna Pressley (MA-07), and Congresswoman Mary Gay Scanlon (PA-05) led 60 of their colleagues in sending a letter to President Biden urging him to use his executive clemency power in the final months of his presidency to reunite families, address longstanding injustices in our legal system, and set our nation on the path toward ending mass incarceration.

The lawmakers hosted a press conference earlier today to discuss the letter. A full video of their press conference is available here and photos are available here.

"Now is the time to use your clemency authority to rectify unjust and unnecessary criminal laws passed by Congress and draconian sentences given by judges," the law-makers wrote in their letter. "The grant of pardons and commutations and the restoration of rights will undoubtedly send a powerful message across the country in support

of fundamental fairness and furthering meaningful criminal justice reform."

Mass incarceration remains a persistent, systemic injustice that erodes the soul of America. Our nation has the highest incarceration rate in the world, with nearly two million people locked in jails and prisons throughout the country. The extreme use of incarceration has resulted in one in two adults having had an incarcerated family member. People of color are dispro-

portionately put behind bars, along with individuals from low-income communities, LGBTQIA+ folks, and those with disabilities. The bloated prison system reflects and emboldens biases that undermine the ideals of our nation and diminish trust in the rule of law. Mass incarceration attacks the most vulnerable Americans, thereby destabilizing families and inflicting intergenerational trauma.

In their letter to President Biden, the lawmakers praised the Presi-

dent's efforts to create a fair and just criminal legal system by pardoning people convicted of simple marijuana possession and LGBTQ+ former servicemembers and urged the President to use his clemency powers to help broad classes of people and cases, including the elderly and chronically ill, those on death row, people with unjustified sentencing disparities, and women who were punished for defending themselves against their abusers. The lawmakers also outlined the fiscal toll of the growing mass incarceration crisis.

"You have the support of millions of people across the country who have felt the harms of mass incarceration: young children longing to hug their grandparents, people who have taken responsibility for their mistakes, and those who simply were never given a fair chance," the lawmakers wrote. "These are the people seeking help that only you can provide through the use of your presidential clemency power."


