

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



The 2025 New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival, presented by Shell, will return to the Fair Grounds Racecourse from April 24th to May 4th, marking its 55th Anniversary as one of the city's most beloved cultural traditions. Known as "Jazz Fest," the event continues to showcase the sounds, flavors, and artistic spirit that define New Orleans and Louisiana.

This year's lineup offers a diverse mix of international headliners and local legends, blending genres from jazz and blues to hip-hop, gospel, and rock. Major acts include Pearl Jam, Dave Matthews

Band, Luke Combs, Lil Wayne & The Roots, Lenny Kravitz, and Santana, alongside hometown favorites like Harry Connick Jr., Irma Thomas, Big Freedia, Preservation Hall Jazz Band, and members of the Marsalis family.

In addition to the music, more than 65 food vendors will serve up signature dishes like crawfish

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
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
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

bread, cochon de lait po'boys, and soft-shell crab po'boys, with a new vegan booth making its debut this year. Cultural exhibits include the Congo Square African Marketplace, Louisiana Marketplace, and the Expedia Cultural Exchange Pavilion, which

will spotlight Mexican music and traditions through performances and artisan displays.

This year's festival also deepens its commitment to sustainability and accessibility, with enhanced public transit options, improved accommodations for guests with

disabilities, and expanded ecofriendly initiatives throughout the festival grounds. Organizers have also added new wellness spaces and community engagement booths that invite attendees to connect with local nonprofits, cultural organizations, and heritage preservation initiatives.

With over 650 performances across 14 stages, parades, crafts, and cultural showcases, Jazz Fest 2025 promises an immersive celebration of the rich heritage that has made New Orleans a

global capital of music. Discounted "Locals Thursday" tickets will be offered on April 24th and May 1st, giving Louisiana residents special access to the festivities.




Celebrating International Jazz Day

A Global Tribute to Unity Through Music



In November 2011, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) officially declared April 30th as International Jazz Day to recognize jazz not only as a treasured art form, but also as a global force for peace, dialogue, and unity. The annual celebration is chaired by UNESCO Director-General Audrey Azoulay and led by legendary Jazz Pianist and Composer Herbie Hancock, who serves as a UNESCO Goodwill Ambassador for Intercultural Dialogue and Chairman of the Herbie Hancock Institute of Jazz, the nonprofit organization that plans and produces the event.



Xavier University of Louisiana Celebrates 100 Years and Honors Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament and Dr. Norman C. Francis

Founded in 1925 by Saint Katharine Drexel and the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament, Xavier University of Louisiana has made momentous strides in just 100

At the root of Xavier's impact is the enduring vision of the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament for educational excellence and social justice, which has prepared this leading HBCU and top Louisiana university for 100 years of good work. The order, founded by Saint Katharine Drexel, changed society by implementing its mission to challenge all forms of racism and other deeply rooted injustices in the world. Establishing a significant university in the Deep South in the 1920s presented numerous challenges, but the Sisters persevered and continue to serve and nurture the university even to

Over two decades after Xavier's founding, a young Norman C.



Dr. Norman C. Francis presided as President of Xavier University of Louisiana for over four decades. During his tenure, his visionary leadership not only elevated Xavier's academic standing, but also left a lasting impact on civil rights, education and social justice across the globe.

Francis left his home in Lafayette, Louisiana, for the adventure of a lifetime. A class of 1952 Mathematics graduate, Francis returned to Xavier in 1955, where he held various roles, but none more important than a 47-year tenure as University President, which began on April 4, 1968. Under his leadership, Xavier became a leader in sending Black

students to medical school. The campus community expanded, enrollment tripled, and the university's historic legacy began to shape. Dr. Norman C. Francis is celebrated as a trailblazer in education and civil rights who has made profound contributions to the nation. Still, most significantly, he is a son of Xavier.

A legacy such as Xavier's

The Watson Memorial Legacy Continues in Algiers

Recently, Bishop Tom Watson and the Board of Directors of Watson Memorial Teaching Ministries reopened their Westbank Church at 1709 Casa Calvo Street in Algiers with a rebranding of its vision for that location as "The Watt Center." Yes, it will be a place of worship, but it will go beyond the four walls of the typical Sunday Morning worship experience. It now becomes a microcosm of its well-known Family Center of Hope, social services, and education agency located at 4137 Washington Avenue in the Broadmoor area of New Orleans where Pastor Pat Watson serves as the CEO. The Watt Center is projected to provide an array of social, cultural, educational, mental health, economic development, and other needed outreach services to

the Algiers Community. During the overpacked re-opening celebration, Bishop Watson was quoted as saying, "we are building the plane as we fly it" and further stated "but this plane will not crash because we are walking by faith."

Apostle Terry Gullage, Pastor of the Mount Calvary Baptist Church in Westwego was the Keynote Speaker and gave a dynamic keynote address that inspired attendees. Councilman Freddie King shared Proclamation from the City of New Orleans and congratulated Bishop Tom and Pastor Pat Watson for their many the community. Gail Thomas, Board President, provided a resolution officially confirming the re-envisioning of this location.

The standing room only crowd made this historical ceremony a great success as several invited ministers shared in the event with Bishop J.D. Wiley of Life Center

Cathedral shared expressions relative to the late Bishop T.B. Pope Francis Dies at 88; Remembered for Compassion and Reform

Pope Francis, the 266th Head of the Roman Catholic Church and the first pontiff from Latin America, died on April 21, 2025, at the age of 88. Born Jorge Mario Bergoglio in Buenos Aires, Argentina, he was elected Pope in 2013 and became known for his humility, progressive voice on social justice, and deep concern for the marginalized.

Throughout his papacy, Pope Francis championed issues such as poverty, climate change, and interfaith dialogue. Despite declining health in recent years, he remained active, delivering a final public blessing on Easter Sunday from a wheelchair in St. Peter's Square.

With deep family roots in New Orleans' musical tradition, Marsalis continues to uphold and innovate the sound of traditional jazz while inspiring new generations.

"This year, we are delighted to share the bandstand with the Prince of New Orleans, Davell Crawford, Grammy Award Winning Trumpeter, Randy Brecker, and World Music Sensation Mahmoud Chouki. We plan to have an international Jazz Party, all night long!"
