

Addressing Black Mental Health During Mental Health Awareness Month



As mental health challenges continue to disproportionately affect Black communities, advocates stress the urgent need for culturally informed care, open dialogue, and collective healing.

Understanding the Crisis

As May marks Mental Health Awareness Month, it's crucial to spotlight the unique mental health challenges faced by the Black community. Despite experiencing mental health conditions at rates comparable to other groups, Black Americans often encounter systemic barriers that hinder access to appropriate care.

According to the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), Black adults living below the poverty line are

more than twice as likely to report serious psychological distress compared to those with higher incomes. Yet only one in three Black adults with mental illness receives treatment. Contributing factors include limited access to culturally competent care, stigma surrounding mental health, and a historical mistrust of the medical system.

A Youth Mental Health Emergency

The Mental Health Crisis is especially alarming among Black youth. Between 2007 and 2020, suicide rates among Black youth rose by 144%, with Black children aged 5-12 nearly twice as likely to die by suicide

compared to their White peers. These figures highlight the urgent need for early intervention, schoolbased support, and safe spaces for youth of color to

Organizations Leading the Way

Several organizations are actively addressing these disparities. Therapy for Black Girls, founded by Dr. Joy Harden Bradford offers culturally competent care and an online directory of therapists who understand the unique experiences of Black women and girls. The Boris Lawrence Henson Foundation, created by Actress Taraji P. Henson, provides scholarships for

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

Black therapists and free services for those in need. In 2024, Henson partnered with Kate Spade to launch wellness pods across the country, expanding access to care in underserved areas.

Celebrity Advocacy and Destigmatization

Public figures are also playing a vital role in shifting the conversation around Black Mental Health. Radio Personality and Author Charlamagne tha God (Lenard McKelvey) launched the Mental Wealth Alliance in 2020 to fund therapy, support mental health education, and grow the number of Black professionals in the field. Through his platform on The Breakfast Club, he continues to normalize mental health discussions, especially among Black men.

Other celebrities, such as Rapper Big Sean, Actress Gabrielle Union, and NBA Star DeMar DeRozan, have also spoken out about their personal struggles with mental health. Their transparency encourages others to seek help and challenges outdated stigmas around vulnerability and emotional well-

being in the Black community.

The Need for Cultural Competency

Dr. Francesca K. Owoo underscores that cultural context is essential for effective treatment. Therapists must not only be clinically qualified but also culturally responsive, understanding the social, historical, and familial dynamics that influence Black patients' experiences. Despite this need, only 5% of psychologists in the U.S. are Black, illustrating a critical gap in representation and care.

Grassroots and Community Efforts

Beyond national movements, grassroots initiatives are helping bridge the gap in care. The AA-KOMA Project, led by Dr. Alfiee Breland-Noble, focuses on Mental Health Education and Services for marginalized youth. Meanwhile, The Sad Girls Club, founded by Elyse Fox, creates digital and in-person support networks for young women of color struggling with anxiety, depression, and trauma.

A Call to Action

As the nation observes Mental Health Awareness Month, it's imperative to center the experiences of Black individuals. Addressing mental health inequities requires not only reform in care delivery but also community-driven solutions, inclusive education, and the continued dismantling of stigma. By promoting culturally competent care and increasing access to Mental Health Resources, we move closer to building a system that supports, affirms, and uplifts Black lives.

Three More Escaped New Orleans Inmates Captured as Manhunt Intensifies for Final Two Fugitives

Three more inmates who escaped from the Orleans Parish Justice Center earlier this week have been captured, authorities confirmed Monday, as the manhunt continues for the last two fugitives still on the run.

The inmates were apprehended separately over the weekend in coordinated efforts involving the New Orleans Police Department, U.S. Marshals, and State Law Enforcement. Officials have not disclosed the exact locations of the captures but said tips from the public played a critical role in tracking down the

"This is a significant step forward in what remains an active and urgent investigation," said NOPD Superintendent Anne Kirkpatrick during a press briefing. "We will not

rest until all five escapees are back in custody."

The escape occurred late Friday

night when a group of six inmates reportedly exploited a security lapse in a shared recreational area.

One of the inmates was quickly recaptured hours later, but the remaining five sparked a citywide

Authorities have increased patrols, established checkpoints, and are working with federal agencies to locate the final two fugitives, who are considered dangerous. Residents are urged to remain vigilant and report any suspicious activity.

"This is a matter of public safety," said Orleans Parish Sheriff Susan Hutson. "We appreciate the community's support and ask for continued cooperation as we pursue every lead to bring these individuals back into custody."

The Sheriff's Office has launched an internal investigation into the escape, and questions remain about how such a breach could occur in a secure facility. Additional security measures have since been implemented at the jail.

Anyone with information about the two remaining escapees is asked to contact CrimeStoppers or the NOPD tip line immediately.


"We have lost a legend, but his spirit lives on in every fight for equity and every young leader he in-

Hate and Chaos Rise in Trump's America

The Southern Poverty Law Center has identified 1,371 hate and antigovernment extremist groups operating across the United States in 2024. In its latest Year in Hate & Extremism Report, the SPLC reveals how these groups are embedding themselves in politics and policymaking while targeting marginalized communities through intimidation, disinformation, and violence. "Extremists at all levels of government are using cruelty, chaos, and constant attacks on communities and our democracy to make us feel powerless," said SPLC President Margaret Huang. The report outlines how hard-right groups aggressively targeted diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) initiatives throughout 2024. Figures on the far right falsely framed DEI as a threat to white Americans, with some branding it a form of "white genocide." After the collapse of Baltimore's Francis Scott Key Bridge, a former Utah legislator blamed the incident on DEI, posting "DEI = DIE."

Tactics ranged from local policy manipulation to threats of violence. The SPLC documented bomb threats at 60 polling places in Georgia, traced to Russian email domains. Similar threats hit Jewish institutions and Planet Fitness locations after far-right social media accounts attacked them for transinclusive policies. Telegram, which SPLC describes as a hub for hate groups, helped extremists crossrecruit between neo-Nazi, QAnon, and white nationalist spaces. The platform's lax moderation allowed groups like the Terrorgram Col-



lective—designated terrorists by the U.S. State Department—to thrive. Militia movements were also reorganized, with 50 groups documented in 2024. Many, calling themselves "minutemen," trained in paramilitary tactics while lobbying local governments for official recognition. These groups shared personnel and ideology with white nationalist organizations.

The manosphere continued to radicalize boys and young men. The Fresh & Fit podcast, now listed as a hate group, promoted misogyny while mocking and attacking Black women. Manosphere influencers used social media algorithms to drive youth toward malesupremacy content. Turning Point USA played a key role in pushing white nationalist rhetoric into mainstream politics. Its leader Charlie Kirk claimed native-born Americans are being replaced by immigrants, while the group advised on Project 2025 and organized Trump campaign events. "We know that these groups build their power by threatening violence, capturing political parties and government, and infesting the mainstream discourse with conspiracy theories," said Rachel Carroll Rivas, interim director of the SPLC's Intelligence Project. "By exposing the players, tactics, and code words of the hard right, we hope to dismantle their mythology and inspire people to fight back."

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
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
