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



Historic Marker Unveiled Honoring Horace C. Bynum Sr.

A large crowd gathered Sunday afternoon at 3840 St. Bernard Avenue to celebrate the unveiling of a Historic Marker honoring the Life and Legacy of Horace

C. Bynum Sr., a pioneering pharmacist, entrepreneur, and Civil Rights Leader in New Orleans. The marker stands at the former site of Bynum's Pharmacy, the business he founded during a time of limited opportunity for Black professionals in healthcare.

The ceremony began at 4:00 p.m. and was led by Mistress of Ceremonies Ilyanette Bernabel, with Mon-

signor John Cisewski delivering an opening invocation. The event brought together city officials, community leaders, historians, and members of the Bynum family, all united in honoring a man whose contributions spanned healthcare, business development, and Civil Rights Advocacy.

A native of Monroe, Louisiana, Bynum was among

the early graduates of Xavier University's College of Pharmacy. Denied employment in White-owned pharmacies, he initially worked at the post office before launching Bynum's Pharmacy in 1947 in the St. Bernard Housing Development. His efforts didn't stop there; he later built the area's first Black-owned shopping center on St. Bernard Ave. and, with

his sons, developed 50 homes in what is now Village de L'Est.

"Mr. Bynum was a trailblazer not only in healthcare but in creating economic opportunities for the Black Community," said Liz Sherman, Executive Director of the Pharmacy Museum.

Former NAACP Chapter President Cyril Saulny reflected on

Bynum's instrumental leadership during the Civil Rights Movement. From 1965 to 1968, Bynum served as President of the local NAACP Chapter, collaborating with Civil Rights Icons such as Judge Thurgood Marshall, Rev. Avery Alexander, A.P. Tureaud, Rev. A.L. Davis, and Mayor Ernest "Dutch" Morial.

Attorney Ernest Jones, repre-

senting the Friends of the Louisiana Civil Rights Museum, presented the Bynum family with an official proclamation. "He was not just a businessman," said Jones, "he was a builder of a better future."

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The ceremony was attended by prominent local figures including City Councilmembers Eugene Green and Oliver Thomas, and Judge Arthur Hunter, highlighting Bynum's deep Civic Legacy.

As the sun began to set, casting a warm glow over the crowd, the unveiling served as a powerful reminder of how


















"By The People" Debate Series Launches August 12th to Center Black and Brown Voices in New **Orleans Elections**







"Art inspires me daily," Judaea explains. "It's how I express myself. I want people to feel empowered and confident in who they are."

Her family has been her greatest support. Her father, Actor Robert DoQui, reflects,

"I learned so much about leadership and commitment through band," she reflects. "It taught me that every role matters just like in life."

At the 2025 ESSENCE Festival Wellness House, where over 25,000 women attended, Judaea staffed the Heart N Hands booth, teaching hands-only CPR and sharing Vital Heart Health Tips.

"It was an honor to represent an organization I love," she says. "It made me realize the impact young people can truly have."

As Judaea departs for Atlanta, she carries with her the lessons of family, faith, music, and service. Her story, rooted in purpose, promise, and heart, is only just beginning.

Dillard University Appoints Dr. Kim Vaz-Deville as Chief of Staff

She is the author of The Baby Dolls: Breaking the Race and Gender Barriers of the New Orleans Mardi Gras Tradition and editor of Walking Raddy:

The Baby Dolls of New Orleans, both of which have become foundational texts in the Study of New Orleans Masking Traditions. Her work has not only shaped local understanding but has reached international audiences through exhibitions in Louisiana and abroad, including at the Musée du quai Branly–Jacques Chirac in Paris.

In her new role as Chief of Staff, Dr. Vaz-Deville will support the President's strategic priorities, foster campus-wide collaboration, and help guide the University's academic and cultural mission. She brings to the position a wealth of experience from her previous leadership roles at Xavier University of Louisiana and the University

of South Florida.

"Dr. Vaz-Deville is a dynamic leader and a cultural visionary whose scholarship and service resonate deeply with Dillard's mission, "said Dr. Monique Guillory, President of Dillard University. Her initiative to revive Louisiana Creole (Kouri Vini) through Baby Doll Masking Culture exemplifies her dedication to preserving and celebrating Louisiana's unique cultural heritage.

In recognition of her significant contributions to education and cultural exchange, Dr. Vaz-Deville was named a Knight in the Order of Academic Palms by the French Republic in 2024.

At Dillard, she looks forward to working alongside faculty, staff, and students to enhance institutional alignment and advance the university's role as a steward of culture, learning, and social responsibility. **National News**

Black Church and Black Press Unite to Empower Black America


In a historic announcement, a coalition of leading Black Faith Organizations and the National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA) unveiled a strategic partnership and plan to confront systemic disparities impacting African American communities nationwide.

Dr. Boise Kimber, President of the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc.; Bishop J. Drew Sheard, Pre-siding Bishop of the Church of God in Christ (COGIC); Dr. Samuel Tolbert, President of the National Baptist Convention of America: and Dr. Benjamin F. Chavis Jr., Veteran Civil Rights Leader and President of the NNPA, are leading this collaboration between the Black Church and Black Media.

"There is strength in unity. There is power in our collective voice. There is hope in our actions," said Dr. Boise Kimber.

For generations, African American communities have endured deep-rooted inequities in healthcare, education, criminal justice, economic opportunity, and access to capital. These challenges are not new. The coalition intends to put an end to fragmented responses and speak with one clear, concise and consolidated voice.

The Black Church and Black Media, two institutions that have

long anchored and uplifted Black America, are now coming together with renewed focus and purpose.

This partnership is grounded in shared values, spiritual conviction, cultural empowerment, and an unwavering commitment to truth, justice, and progress.

The coalition will focus on five core initiatives: (BOLD)

Shaping a unified national narrative that challenges harmful stereotypes and amplifies stories of Black resilience, excellence, and innova-

Mobilizing faith-based and media networks to address community disparities through solutions-

focused advocacy and outreach

Holding corporate America accountable by demanding responsible reinvestment in Black communities through sustainable partnerships, economic equity, and community-led development

Empowering the next generation by reclaiming our narratives and creating new pathways for education, leadership, and entrepreneur-

Holding elected officials accountable by spotlighting those whose policies do not align with the interests of the Black community. To earn our votes, they must heed our voices.

"This is more than a symbolic gesture; it is a strategic and spiritual alignment." When the Black Church and Black Media speak as one, we can ignite a movement. When we organize as one, we can shift the narrative. When we act as one, we cannot be ignored or denied," the coalition stated.

The coalition invites all stakeholders, faith leaders, media professionals, community organizers, educators, business leaders, and concerned citizens to join this movement for unity, justice, and
